Normandy 2024

Last week saw our Year 8 pupils travel to Normandy, accompanied by OLCHS staff and a number of Year 10 pupils. It was a very special school trip on the 80th anniversary of the Normandy, D-Day, Landings.

The start of our Normandy trip began by meeting in the school sports hall with our bags packed. We met our groups and chatted for a bit until the coaches arrived, then it was time to set off on our journey.

The coach ride from Preston to Normandy is long, but we stopped at a service station in England for a break, after which we all tried to grab the moments of sleep we could, as we grew ever closer to our border crossing at the Channel Tunnel. In the early hours we reached France where we made a stop at the French services, where people stocked up on French snacks and began putting into good use our French speaking skills. A special moment here was when some Our Lady's pupils played the café piano for everyone's entertainment.

We jumped back on the coach and made our way to Honfleur, a small classic French town, with beautiful architecture and a harbour bursting with activity. We ate our lunch in groups with our group leaders and explored all the town had to offer for a couple of hours, with many of us practicing the French we had been learning in school to order ice creams.





Back on the coach, we were eager to arrive at the chateau - our accommodation for the trip. On arrival at the chateau, we were shown to our rooms and unpacked before we went downstairs and listened to a talk from OLCHS staff about the days to follow, all of us excitedly looking forward to the busy days ahead. It was then time for our first home cooked French meal, a few evening games, and a good night's sleep, concluding the first day.

Day 2

After a classic continental breakfast with pastry, yogurts, and cereal, we were soon on the coach, going to the Merville Franceville German Batterie. This was an important location in World War II to destroy the antiaircraft missiles which would have prevented D-Day from taking place. While I visit was educational, it was also very engaging. Everyone thought this was a wonderful place to start the history part of this trip. Next, we took a short drive to Pegasus Bridge, where the paratroopers landed on 6 June 1944 to secure the area and allow the allies to enter France after the landings. We stopped for lunch on a scenic coastline near the village of Ver-sur-Mer and visited the recently built British War Memorial. We took some great photos of the memorial and the French coastline. Our next stop was a trip to the Arromanches 360° cinema where we watched the full story of the D-Day landings.




Following the visit to the Arromanches 360° cinema, we took a short drive to Bayeux and saw the Bayeux Tapestry depicting the conquest of William I in 1066. To reflect on the day, we then drove to the British war graves. Some of the pupils laid crosses to pay respect. Finally, we headed home to the chateau and enjoyed fish and chips, followed by evening entertainment.

Day 3

It was time for the much-anticipated trip to Mont-Saint-Michel. We all got dressed into shorts or rollable trousers and headed to the bus which drove us to the site. We met our tour guides who took us across the salt marshes. We had an amazing time walking through the clay and jumping on the quicksand. It truly was a once in a lifetime experience that was quite obviously enjoyed by all. Once we had walked across to the bay, we all dried our feet and ate our lunch admiring the 1000-year-old architecture and the magnificent abbey of Mont-Saint-Michel. We then had about an hour to look around the town in our groups. This was a perfect opportunity to spend our euros on souvenirs and experience some true French culture as we explored the bustling ancient streets. We concluded the day by heading back to the chateau for our evening meal and afterwards we spent the evening playing football on the field, dancing in the disco, or just simply enjoying our last night with our friends and soaking up the last moments of Normandy 2024.

We finally reached border control and got through without any trouble, before taking the channel tunnel back to England and making the final journey back to Preston.

Normandy 2024 has been an incredible experience and one that we will cherish forever.




Careers
