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PRESTON SCHOOL'S CROSS-COUNTRY COMPETITION.

Fifty-eight pupils across all year groups represented Our Lady's in the annual Preston cross country championships which was once again held at St Cecilia's and Longridge High Schools. The heavy rain earlier in the day had threatened to make the event a very muddy one however the fields held up nicely and the sun even made an appearance, much to the delight of the competitors! All pupils in the team represented Our Lady's superbly, showing many school virtues in their quest for individual and team success. George Rainford of Year 11 comfortably won the U16 Boys' race after leading from the front for the majority of the race. Will Murray finished in 3rd place after a great battle throughout the race with a runner from Longridge High School. As the two of them dashed for the finish Will was just beaten to the line. Both Leighton Hewitt and Emil Dawkins managed to finish inside the top 10 while Charlie Crook came in 11th place to surely secure a team win in the U16 boys' category. In the girls' U16 team Lucy Mulholland finished in an excellent 4th place, with Lucy Beesley 7th and Freya Jones 9th. This group of senior girls and boys along with Daniel Stewart, Liam McCaul, Jake Kippax, Liam Taylor, Mark Law and Jacob Lucas were tremendous role models for the younger pupils and will surely have inspired the next generation of distance runners. Other notable top 10 finishers (and likely to be selected for the district team) included Evie Mitchell of Year 8 who finished 10th in the U14 girls' race and Isaac Slack who finished 3rd in the Year 7 boys' race.

FOOTBALL NEWS

In the **Year 8** vs Archbishop Temple League Match and Lancashire Cup Double Header, the first half started strongly for Archbishop, they took control of the game and cruised to a 2-0 lead. The Our Lady's lads didn't let this dampen their spirits and desire as they shifted up another gear to get back into the game. By half time, two goals from Shay Sedge-Martins meant it was all square. Our Lady's were riding the wave of confidence into the second half and 10 minutes in, a fantastic individual effort by Will Bartlett put the lads 3-2 up! There were plenty of chances for both teams as the second half played out, but with just 5 mins to go, a last-ditch lunge to clear the ball in defence resulted in an Archbishop penalty. 3-3, and extra time and the lottery of penalties was on its way. Extra time played out with not much to report as both teams were starting to show fatigue and didn't want to try anything too risky so late into the day. This said, it would need a penalty shoot out to decide who would progress through to the next round of the cup. Two fantastic saves by Mckenzie Gavin between the sticks and neatly put away penalty kicks by the brave lads who stepped up was enough to seal the victory. They will play the winner of Ribblesdale vs Blackpool St Mary's in the next round of the cup.

Year 11 played two games during the week commencing 10 October. The first of these was a dominant 10-3 win over Archbishop Temple, in which Leighton Hewitt and Isaac Webster both scored hat-tricks. The remaining goals were scored by Charlie Crook (2), Toby Atherton and Jay Pearson. The strength and depth of the team was fantastic and the sportsmanship showed well between both teams, regardless of the score line. Their second game of the week was a tough contest against Corpus Christi, in which a depleted Our Lady's squad fought valiantly against a full-strength opposition, only to fall short at the final whistle as they lost 4-2. Even in losing the team showed tremendous heart and character, working effortlessly to try to get the win but just missing out.

The **Year 9** football team also had a huge win this week; defeating Longridge High School 10-3 in an end to end game that was full of goals right from the start. The rainy weather seems to follow this team whenever they play and this game was no different. In constant heavy rain, the game saw 6 goals in the first 19 minutes, at which time the score was 3-3 and either team looked like they could win the game. But after another goal for Our Lady's took the team into half time 4-3 ahead there seemed to be no looking back. Three quick goals in the first 10 minutes of the second half gave the team an unassailable lead and a final flurry of three more made the final score 10-3 to Our Lady's. Goal scorers were Lee Reed (4), Jake Watters, Mahad Rahman, Luke Kane, Harrison Collinson, Alex Black and Owen Inglis.
