The Theme Next Week: Revelation, The Wedding at Cana. (John 2: 1 -11)

Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim.

'Now draw some out and take it to the master of the feast.' So, they took it. When the master tasted the water now become wine, he did not know where it came from. He called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first and when people have drunk freely, then the poor wine. But you have kept the good wine until now.' This, the first of his signs, Jesus did at Cana in Galilee, and manifested his glory. And his disciples believed in him.

The Wedding at Cana is one of three events in which God is revealed to us through Jesus Christ. In fact, the Feast of the Epiphany which we celebrated on the 6th of January, is not the only event that is referred to as an 'Epiphany'. The word 'Epiphany' means 'Revelation'. These events are The Magi's visit, The Lord's Baptism, and The Wedding at Cana. The Magi's pay homage, revealing the divinity of the child-king who will die for his people. Jesus' baptism in the Jordan reveals Jesus as the Son of God as the power of the Holy Spirit is poured down on him. The Wedding at Cana reveals the divine power at work as Jesus transforms water into wine. His first miracle.

Dear Lord, we need a miracle today.

Like Jesus changing water into wine at the wedding feast in Cana,

we need a miracle today.

We are tired of the hurts of this world.

We are discouraged in the face of injustice, war, poverty, and indifference.

Lord, in this year of jubilee, crown us with your love,

that in you we may be moved to acts of kindness, love, justice, and mercy.

Pupils demonstrated an impressive understanding of challenges such as oxygen production, water purification, energy generation, and the harsh conditions on Mars.



On Monday 13 January, Hutton Grammar school invited a team of Year 8 pupils from Our Lady's to take part in the National IET Faraday Challenge. The group of six Year 8 pupils worked together to design and build a prototype for a product that could assist a need; educate a child; or for someone who takes part in a sport.

Pupils had a budget to spend on materials to make their prototype, so they had to think carefully about the product they were going to make. Pupils had to design, develop, create and present their ideas and the prototype to a group of judges. No further details can be given about the task as the competition is live. Pupils were marked on each area including teamwork.

There was strong competition from the other teams and on this occasion OLCHS pupils narrowly missed out on going to the next stage of the competition. However, their ideas, teamwork and presentation skills were exceptional! Each pupil left with an Industrial Cadets Challenger Award for completing a hands-on problem solving and critical thinking activity.

Pupils presented themselves and the school extremely well against the other five schools from Preston and surrounding areas. A massive well done to pupils from Our Lady's, Chris, Michael, Elliot, Chloe, Orzela and Zarish – you did a fantastic job.




